FROM THE INTERIM PASTOR

The recently released movie <u>Selma</u> looks at the struggles for civil rights, and particularly the pressures on Martin Luther King, Jr., as a preacher, pastor, husband and father, voice of conscience, strategist, and leader of a movement. If you have not seen it, I recommend that you do.

In life, we can have moments of crisis: crises of energy when we can no longer put one foot in front of the other; crises of hope where we question that our actions can make any difference for good; crises of failure when our best intentions are undermined by revenge, greed, and pride; crises of loss when consequences for our actions takes a toll on the lives of others.

It is in the context of celebrating Martin Luther King, Jr. this week, and his legacy of struggling for human rights and equality that we encounter the texts for this Sunday. The first miracle recorded in the Gospel of John is when Jesus turned water into wine at a wedding feast. This opportunity for God's work came in the midst of a crisis. What happens for us when the wine runs out? What happens when all our resources are depleted and we have nothing else to give?

Join us in worship as Holy Scripture engages us in the deepest struggles of what it means to be human and to be God's people who are called into a beloved community.

SCRATCH UPDATE


