

Confirmands and mentors are invited to our second floor room at 9:45 for some soul-searching around the big questions of faith. We are approaching the end of our process, and it is important that everyone continue our streak of excellent attendance.

FROM THE ASSOCIATE PASTOR

Dear friends,

I don't know about you, but I have been thrown lately by the loss of some truly remarkable people of faith in our midst. One of them was *Dean Smith*, the former basketball coach at UNC. Even if you weren't a Tarheels fan, you had to admire Dean Smith for the way he lived his faith, both on and off the court. I was so impressed, frankly, by the passage he chose to have read and preached at his funeral: The Parable of the Sheep and the Goats from Matthew 25. For the greatest of coaches to be concerned about the least of these, makes quite a statement of faith.

Then there was the loss of *Syngman Rhee*, the former Moderator of the PC(USA). Rhee was from NORTH KOREA, fled to South Korea, and then emigrated to the USA for college at Davis and Elkins in West Virginia. I met him there during my first pastorate, and found him to be an amazing saint of the church. I saw him again at General Assembly in Detroit this summer, and had no idea he was nearing the end of his journey. The church has lost one of its greatest global advocates in Rhee.

And lastly, there is **Steve Hayner**, the President of Columbia Theological Seminary, who succumbed recently to pancreatic cancer. Steve was a gift to CTS, who didn't fit easily into any of the usual categories. He had some evangelical leanings, and some global practices; he was a great friend to Presbyterians on both sides of the fence; he loved Jesus and he loved the local church and the larger church. Columbia Seminary and the PC(USA) will miss him greatly, this brave fighter. I hope our own PNC will notice in Hayner a lovely fusion of boundarybreaking witness that might be appropriate for our next pastor.

I mourn these losses, but I'm also overwhelmed by what we have gained by these witnesses. Our church is sad from losing *BJ Seitzer* last month. But your love for the Seitzers was so powerful on Sunday as so many of you stood in the FPC Memorial Garden, shoulder to shoulder, in the freezing rain, poking each other in the eye with your umbrellas, to be in solidarity with this family in their grief and in our witness to the resurrection. Life lived in God's grace is precious.
