FROM THE ASSOCIATE PASTOR

Every year on the Fourth Sunday of Easter the gospel reading is taken from Chapter 10 of John, in which Jesus identifies himself as the Good Shepherd. God in Christ will watch over his people. The Reformed Tradition has always had an expanded focus on ministry of both the baptized and the ordained. (That very relationship was a question on my Theology Ordination Exam in 2006.) Certainly, here at First Pres we have a wonderful experience of the potential for ministry of all the baptized. In this transition period of leadership how many times have I heard members speak of "stepping up" in service to the congregation? Many times! Our Mission Study document (pastoral care, fellowship, education, prayer and worship) captures how intentional we need to be about calling forth the people's gifts for ministry. The image of shepherd that is associated with ministry tends to make us focus on leadership roles too exclusively. There are many ways that real ministry is exercised in very modest roles that do not require one to be in the limelight of leadership. I see it every day here in our community. Those quiet, background ministries are often (in my opinion, and I think in God's, too) just as surely helping to shepherd our community as are the roles that get more attention.

Sharon Hirsch was at **Ann Prospero's** house on April 11th to help her "cull" some of her books and other possessions in preparation for her move to assisted living. Seeing five other FPC members there (Andy Henry, Dawn Carsey, George Danser, Homer and Pat Ashby, and Caroline Pritchett), quietly hard at work painting the interior of her home to get it ready to go on the market, struck her at how important this support is for a major life change. It is a reminder of how much is done very quietly, behind the scenes but still making a profound difference. Good Shepherd Sunday should be for all of us a time to examine our consciences on how well we have contributed to the care and feeding of the flock of Christ in this part of God's Kingdom.
