ASSOCIATE PASTOR Dear friends,

Two church study groups are taking a look at David Brook's new book, The Road to Character. I see his book as a lament over a value system lost to modern culture that aspires to success more than substance, or as he terms it, to the external Adam I over the internal Adam II. "Adam II," he says, "lives by an inverse logic, not an economic one. You have to give to receive. You have to surrender to something outside yourself to gain strength within yourself. You have to conquer your desire to get what you crave. ... In order to fulfill yourself, you have to forget yourself. In order to find yourself, you have to lose yourself." (Brooks, p. xii)

Hmmm . . . I think we've heard this before. In this Sunday's Gospel lesson, Jesus' disciples are arguing with one another about how to be the greatest. And Jesus tells them, "Whoever wants to be first must be last of all and servant of all." And then he shows them as much by embracing a little, powerless child. (Mark 9:30-37)

I might argue that David Brook's lament is about the loss of the church's moral influence over our culture. The Bible has always proclaimed the strange paradox of losing ourselves and surrendering ourselves to something larger (God) in order to find ourselves. Maybe our culture is ready to hear and embrace that message once again. And maybe it's time for the church to open our doors more, to tweet and text and blog more, and to go out into the neighborhood more, to share the Good News that our culture just might be ready to receive. Thank you, David Brooks, for voicing your lament.
