FROM THE ASSOCIATE PASTOR

Immigration

I am leading an independent study for a talented student in Religious Studies at Duke on the Prophet Zoroaster and Zoroastrianism. I hasten to add that the student knows more than I do. My only connection with the topic is the stargazing Magi. They have always fascinated me, and in fact, some scholars indicate that the Magi were Zoroastrian priests. I know it is really early to be addressing the story of the Magi, but for me it is a story of perseverance and divine intervention. It is all richly symbolic of the universality of our faith as we ponder our response to the worst migration crisis since World War II.

At Faith and Community Class, it was fascinating for us to hear about the work of *Margaret Keller*, *Jane Rourk*, and others who provided sanctuary for Vietnamese and Cuban refugees over the vears. In June our denomination acknowledged World Refugee Day and the need for refugee advocacy. This is a time for us to reflect together on our giftedness as a community—a giftedness that is enhanced by our diversity. With all the noise and static from politicians playing on the fears of "difference" you would never know of the many gifts immigrants have contributed to our country. Let us look forward to what we will become as others add their richness to our country.

Each year we are invited to renew our wonder at the irony of the scene described in Matthew, the scene of Magi astrologers from Persia kneeling in a stable, bearing gifts for an infant whose birth was heralded by a star. Let us seek a time for prayer that leads to a recommitment to minister to refugees and immigrants coming to our country.


