FROM THE

ASSOCIATE PASTOR

The Longing for a Savior As **Marilyn** has noted, we hear from the prophets, Mary, and John, and others their testimonies of hope during the season of Advent. The names and places and cultures change but the longing for a Savior is felt as deeply by us as by our Jewish ancestors. We see around us the awful realities of famine, terrorism, and infectious disease, violence in our homes and on our streets. From the depths of our troubled hearts we cry out with the psalmist, why, O Lord, why? We yearn for a Messiah to save us from so much that is wrong with us and with our world.

The prophet Micah knew that from us would come "one who is to rule in Israel." The saving God, for whom we long must first be born in our hearts if ever we are to see a world transformed. Advent is a time of anticipation, just as much as it is a time of longing, for we know that the prophet's hopes have been fulfilled in the birth of Christ. We do not act as if, nor pretend, that Christ has not been born in Bethlehem of Ephrathah. Rather, we connect to the ancient testimonies for the Messiah's birth so that our hearts today can be more open to his presence now in our midst.

This Advent let us all join together asking God to come into the broken places of our world so that peace and justice may flourish and those who suffer may be healed and comforted.
