Dear Friends,

As Hurricane Joaquin has swirled into our lives this week, I have imagined all of the possibilities for disaster in our immediate area (it's called anxiety!): flooding, wind damage, power outages, food shortages. And I wondered if it wouldn't be a good idea for us to "neighbor check" one another by zip code, should any of these things occur. Now, it looks like the worst of the storm will be out at sea, and the worst of the flooding will be to our south. But perhaps it would be a good idea, nevertheless, to divide our congregation into zip code groups to take care of one another, just as Jesus did in all four gospel accounts when he fed 5,000 or more at-risk people. Then these neighbor groups might also be in place to gather and celebrate our new pastor when that occurs (keep praying!).

I'm so pleased with the divide and conquer attitude of our congregation during this interim time. Leaders have stepped up within the congregation and are doing a fantastic job of seeing visions and dreaming dreams, and then making those happen without too much poking and prodding from me. I love the empowered laity that I am seeing, which makes me even more hopeful about the future health of our congregation.


