A MINUTE FOR STEWARDSHIP

(Given in worship on Sunday, October 25) I was asked to tell you what First Presbyterian means to me. Well that's easy. It is home. It is safe ground. It is sanctuary

We have moved often over the years, and finding the right church home can be a challenge. While visiting churches, I have been completely ignored in some and pursued in others, as if I were fresh blood in the water and they were hungry sharks. Very few get it right. The right church is friendly, welcoming and open. It feels like coming home. It feels like safe ground. It feels like sanctuary. When we moved to Durham, I was going to take the whole summer and visit as many churches as I could. There was no hurry. The second church I walked into was First Presbyterian, and I never left. This church got it right. The inclusive mission statement, the wonderful music program, and the unbelievable beauty and sound of the sanctuary drew me. Open and friendly, Shirley Frederick, Carlisle Harvard, and several others told me that they were glad I had come and they hoped I would come again. After the service, I went up to thank Kathy Parkins for dropping the organ out and letting us sing one verse of the hymn a cappella, and she invited me to lunch. It was immediately evident that this was the kind of church I was looking for. I never looked back. I was home. I was safe. I had sanctuary.

I believe that to truly be a member of a church, you need to become involved, to grow, to give back. Give of your wealth and your time, not just what you can spare from what is left over after all the bills are paid and your other jobs done, but as a priority.

I became active in the music program, Bible Study and the Property Committee as a way to grow, to give back to, and be fed by my church. This lovely old lady gives so many people a safe harbor. Not only as a place of worship and learning for our members, a safe place to grow and question for our youth, but as a meeting place for members of the community. The Day School does a wonderful job. There are music groups that practice here, and 12-step programs that call First Presbyterian home. We have hosted scout groups and overnight youth groups. We have an active walk-in ministry. For all of these people and more, this building, this church, is home, safe ground, sanctuary.

Much of our mission depends on our space. We couldn't do all this without this building and it takes a lot of work and money to keep her going. Your giving keeps the lights on, the rain out, and the grounds lovely. Your giving keeps her cool in the summer and warm in the winter. Your giving makes it possible to do what we do. So I urge you to give generously of both your money and your time. Find a group to join. We have social groups for all ages. Come in and dust the pews, weed the gardens. Be a once a month Sunday School teacher so our teachers can come to a worship service. Be a youth advisor, join a Bible Study. I guarantee you will receive more than you give while you keep our church a welcoming home, safe ground, and sanctuary. Thank you. Kate Busa
