FROM THE ASSOCIATE PASTOR

This Sunday's celebration serves as a hinge between two seasons. **The Baptism of the Lord** is the last day of the Christmas season; the following week we begin what is known as "ordinary time." The Lord's baptism by John in the Jordan marks a climatic manifestation of the mystery of God among us. That mystery, first revealed on the night of the Savior's birth, is extended in Sundays after Christmas, to Epiphany as different facets of the great mystery of the Wordmade-flesh. All have been presented to us and celebrated by us in the prayers and readings of each worship service.

This Sunday, we celebrate Jesus' anointing with Spirit that launched his ministry of compassion and healing to all who suffer. This is as it should be for a people to whom the birth of salvation has just been announced. But we, like the rest of the world, must also return to our everyday lives and routine. However, in less than six weeks' time, we begin again a special sacred season of Lent-Easter. For now, with Sunday's observance of the beginning of Jesus' public ministry, we are reminded to be about the business of our own mission and ministry. Church committees and ministry groups will be shaking off their holiday slumber and renewing their efforts to be about the task of proclaiming the Good News of God's love. Marilyn met with program staff to sketch out the church ministry and worship calendar for 2016. It is a full one. Hopefully, our observance of the holy days just ending has renewed in us a sense of wonder that God dwells in our own human flesh, and that the work of Jesus the Christ is carried forward through our own weak human efforts. There is little that is "ordinary" about the privilege that is ours to share in the mission and ministry of Jesus!
