

Adults can either attend the Lectionary Class for the summer or study Short Stories by Jesus: The Enigmatic Parables of a Controversial Rabbi, by Amy-Jill Levin (Watts-Hill Hall). Levin, a Jewish scholar of the New Testament, posits that Jesus intended for the parables to be provocative, and that we should look for the discomfort which they provoke within us. Her book will be available for purchase the first few weeks of the class. Children and youth will watch movies and celebrate Christmas in July (all of July).

### **HELP FOR**

#### **MEALS ON WHEELS**

The pantry at Meals on Wheels is almost empty. While they have a caterer for daily meals, they make weekend meals themselves. The 80 clients who receive two extra meals each Friday depend on these meals to get them through the weekend. The Food Bank does not have a steady supply of items for Meals on Wheels' weekend meals during the summer as the Food Bank's efforts are geared towards supporting children who are not in school. Meals on Wheels could really use the following items this summer:

Fruit cups (unsweet – individual size)

Applesauce (unsweet – individual size)
Soup (low sodium if possible – pop top)
Canned meals (i.e. spaghetti) – pop top)
Peanut Butter/Cheese Cracker snacks
Tuna and crackers packages

Breakfast/ Nutrition bars
Granola bars (chewy/soft)
Juice boxes

#### **AID TO FLOOD VICTIMS**

In a series of extreme weather conditions, the South Central U.S. has experienced continued flooding and storm damage. Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) is working with impacted mid councils in Texas, Louisiana, and Mississippi to bring God's hope and healing to all affected by flooding. Gifts from One Great Hour of Sharing are helping Presbyterian congregations as they reach out to their affected communities to provide emergency items like water, food and other urgent supplies to neighbors in need. Members of the PDA National Response Team (NRT) will be helping with assessments, connecting with long-term recovery groups, and serving as a present witness of the larger church during this difficult time. PDA has disaster coordinators and NRT members already on the ground in Houston, Texas assessing the needs. NRT members are also being deployed to Louisiana and Mississippi to assess the needs and assist the affected congregations and Mid Councils about next steps.
