From the Pastor . . .

First Presbyterian Church – A beacon of light and hope in the city of Durham

Jesus said, "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness, but will have the light of life."

Dear friends,

This Sunday at our annual congregational meeting, I shared my thoughts about the "state of the church." Here is a condensed version for those who could not be with us:

FPC is a healthy and visionary community of faith equipped with the necessary tools to move us into the next fifty years of witnessing to the gospel message of God's love for the world in Christ and the way the Holy Spirit moves among us to shape and reform us. We have much to celebrate!

- 1) We have a **strong identity**: We know ourselves to be people called to a **life of love** toward God, one another, and our neighbors in need. We are a people of **welcome and hospitality**. We are known to be a **safe place** for all to worship, to marry, and to be active in the community. We rejoice that we are **diverse** in our membership, even as we strive for greater diversity. We foster strong **interfaith relationships** and **ecumenical relationships** with our friends of faith in Durham.
- 2) We **worship** God in spirit and in truth, with word and song, with passion, energy, imagination, joy, faithfulness, and hope for our future.
- 3) We grow together in **study and service**, recognizing that we are on a journey together, that we are stronger together and that we have much to learn about what it means to love God and love neighbor. We honor and celebrate the gifts of children and youth in our midst.
- 4) We work for **social justice** in the city and in the world. We respond to the urgent needs of God's people while also working for systemic change that will benefit those on the margins, the "least of these."
- 5) We have a **gifted and committed staff team** and **dedicated and faithful lay leaders.** Our staff and lay leaders have provided solid, wise, and consistent leadership as we moved through a three-year transition following the retirement of a beloved, long-term pastor and continue to provide leadership as we envision our future together.
- 6) We are **financially stable**, **but need to be realistic about our finances**. This year, because of many converging factors, our pledges fell short of budgeted needs. The Session responded to the shortfall by approving a realistic 2017 budget which included significant cuts to Property, Personnel, and Service and Mission Committee budgets, in addition to a draw from the reserve fund. Though these cuts were painful in many ways, the Session

believes this budget will enable FPC to move more realistically into the future. We celebrate the generous gifts of PFC members that continue to show faithfulness, gratitude, and excitement about the future.

I am happy to discuss any of the above with you at any time. I am excited to be a part of this community of faith which brings the light and hope of Christ to the world.

SUNDAY SCHOOL

STEPUP MINISTRY: Beginning April 4, StepUp Durham will begin Step2 of its Employment Program. Step2 is a weekly program that will wrap nine months of life-skills, stability, and support around those who have become newly-employed and working at least 30 hours per week. Phase one of Step2 will focus on personal development; phase two will focus on financial coaching; and phase three, on career growth. "StepUp Durham's vision for Step2 is that it will be a place where people grow and thrive, create and accomplish goals and build a deeper sense of community, stronger self-awareness, greater financial stability, and clarity for how to obtain the type of joy they could call a career."

Volunteers are needed every Tuesday night from 5:45-8:30 at CityWell Church, 2317 Chapel Hill Road, in the following areas:

- *Co-Partner/Mentor Be trained to walk alongside and support a StepUp participant weekly as they set and accomplish their personal, professional, and financial goals. (Training will be Tuesday, March 21 from 6-8 at CityWell Church)
- *Childcare and Homework Buddies Provide supervision and homework help for children (ages 0-16) of StepUp adults.
- *Meal Donation Help StepUp provide a nutritious dinner to the 10 families participating in Step2 pilot program (*Marie Sappenfield* and *Marilyn Hedgpeth* are providing a meal the first Tuesday of every month. They would love to have others on their meal team; or establish another meal time to cover other Tuesdays.)
- *Instruction Offer to teach or coach participants on a skill in which you have expertise (i.e. setting S.M.A.R.T. goals, leaning into personality strengths, credit repair, career development, budgeting, etc.)

StepUp Durham partners with adults seeking to transform their lives through employment and life skills training. Classes are designed specifically for individuals facing barriers to finding employment, such as a criminal background or gaps in employment history. FPC is proud to be a sponsor of StepUp Durham. Blount is the president and professor of New Testament at Union Presbyterian Seminary, Richmond, VA, and Charlotte, NC. An M.Div. graduate of Princeton Seminary in 1981, he obtained his B.A. from the College of William and Mary in 1978. He received his Ph.D. in New Testament Studies from Emory University in 1992 and returned to teach at Princeton Seminary the same year. His primary work has been in the Gospel of Mark, the Book of Revelation and in the area of cultural studies and hermeneutics. He is an associate editor of the New Interpreter's Dictionary of the Bible for Abingdon Press and the General Editor for True To Our Native Land: An African American New Testament Commentary by Fortress Press. He preaches and directs adult education classes in local congregations. He and his wife Sharon have two children, Joshua and Kaylin.
