From the Associate Pastor . . .

The Wisdom of Children

Marilyn Hedgpeth and the McDows shared with me from the Faith and Community Sunday school sessions that addressed School shootings. I pray that what was different at Parkland, Florida, from all other series of killings from Colorado to Newtown is the message that "Enough is Enough." These young people are signs and a challenge to the consciences of all Americans to wake up. May their tenacity and persistence continue! May they receive our full support along the way! May we move out of our slumber where the banality of evil and a sense of normalcy reigns which numbs our demand for meaningful action from our elected officials!

I preached a sermon in 2012 at the time of the Newtown massacre called "The Family Table." I really believed at that time that we finally reached the tipping point where action and consensus on eliminating the legal sale of assault rifles would be reached. And frankly since then it has been exhausting to repeat the same arguments about gun control as our children are massacred from Columbine to Sandy Hook to Parkland and Santa Fe. I laid out three directions to follow: the way of compassion, the way of prayer, and the way of hope.

The time has come now for us to demand in the pending midterm election cycle that those who wish to be elected as representatives to Congress announce to us their positions clearly on banning military style weapons that are produced to kill human beings. The ban on military-style weapons will not solve the problem but without that ban no series of other actions will succeed. The front page story of the *News and Observer* on June 11th indicates that our elected officials will be held accountable because of the wisdom and outcries initiated by the students of Parkland.

Laura and the children of America have roused us from our sleep; we must pursue the dreams and the hopes that our children are so committed to achieve in their genuine outrage.



Book Group


The Things That Matter Book Group will meet THIS EVENING,
