From the Pastor . . .

Dear friends,

It was late afternoon on Saturday by the time I heard the news of the horrific violence at the Tree of Life synagogue in Pittsburgh, PA. I had been away from the media all day in places of significant diversity and powerful love – first at the Durham CAN assembly around prison reform, where almost 600 people gathered in our sanctuary – black, brown, and white siblings from different faiths and denominations, of every age, with different languages and cultures, and then at the New Hope Presbytery meeting in Raleigh where pastors and ruling elders gathered to support one another in the work and ministries of our congregations and our lives.

I cannot fathom how hatred like this against a group of people can exist in the heart of a human being. This community of Jewish believers was at worship, in a sacred space, offering prayers for peace, blessing a child, when all changed for them forever. Our hearts ache for the grief, pain, fear, anger, and confusion felt by this community and people around the world who have learned about this act of violence and hatred. Like the Psalmist, we cry out, "How long, O Lord?"

I do not know why there is evil in the world and why humans are capable of hurting one another in ways that are unfathomable. I do not know why pain exists or why disease or tragedy strikes some and not others. I do not know what fuels the fires of hatred to burn in some against others. I do not know.

I do believe, however, that we are not alone. That our pain is felt deeply by the God who created us and desires for us to live in love for one another. I believe that our tears are blended with God's tears as we face the pains that come into our lives undeserved. I believe that God is our God and that we do not walk alone in the valley of the shadow of death, but are surrounded by the everlasting arms. God is our God. We are not left without hope.

This week I share a prayer from our *Book of Common Worship*. I pray that it might bring you support in the face of this and other tragedies in our world and in our lives:

God our refuge, shelter us under your wings as we kneel before you in grief and pain. We pray for all those who have lost a beloved child, parent, sibling, lover, or friend . . . those who have witnessed horror . . . those who are wounded in body or spirit . . . for each of them is a child made in your image. We pray for ourselves, O Lord. Restore our hope, and mend our hearts, even as we weep with grief and tremble with anger. Give us strength to support the brokenhearted, and your light to find our way in the darkness, that we may be bearers of your light to all we encounter, in the name of Christ, our healer and our light. Amen.

May God be with us all and bring peace to our broken world.



SESSION BRIEFS . . .

October 2018

The Session met on October 22, 2018. Following dinner with the Diaconate and conversations with six people interested in joining the congregation, the Session began the meeting by voting to receive the new members into the life of First Presbyterian.

The Session approved three motions:

- 1. Serving of wine at the reception prior to the **SONAM** concert on the evening of January 5, 2019;
- 2. Giving new members a copy of **Peter Fish's** history of FPC when they join the church;
- 3. Approving a letter to **Reynolds American Inc**. which endorses the boycott of VUSE e-cigarettes, in support of NC farmworkers.

Most of the meeting was spent in discussions led by members of the Strategic Planning Team (SPT), in small groups and all together, considering the process of strategic planning at First Presbyterian. The Session asked the SPT to continue their work, and for the SPT to bring to the Session proposals from outside consultants to facilitate the development of a strategic plan.

Finally, *Delia Kwon* and *Dewey Lawson* were elected as delegates to the New Hope Presbytery held October 27, 2018, and *Kim Abels* was attending as an observer.

STRATEGIC PLANNING TEAM

Dear FPC members and friends,

Your Strategic Planning Team met with the Session on October 22, 2018 for a small group and large group discussion. During this time, we discussed the following (among other things):

- What a strategic plan is not. It is not a document to be put on a shelf and never referred to again. It is not a business plan. It is not a new mission study. It does not mean that anything is wrong with what we are currently doing. In fact, we are pretty enthused about worship, education, and ministry at FPC. We know we have areas that could be strengthened (our children's ministry, our facility), but we also know that FPC is built upon a firm foundation of faithful stewardship of gifts, vision, and resources across almost 150 years.
- What a strategic plan is. The kind of plan we hope to develop will take the work FPC has done recently through the Mission Study and the eight Core Values of the church (Reformed Worship, Diversity and Inclusivity, Faith Exploration, Pastoral Care, Historic Placement, Social Mission, Faithful Stewardship, and Community <u>Core Values</u>). This study and these values will help us map our specific steps to help us enhance our ministries at FPC and fulfill our vision of being the church in the heart of Durham that God has called us to be.
- **Communication** The Session encouraged us to do a better job of communicating with the congregation as we do our work so that everyone can be on-board and informed.
- The need for an outside perspective to guide us in next steps The Session voted unanimously to support the team as it interviews potential outside persons /teams to help guide this discernment process and give an objective perspective alongside the internal subjective perspective of the Session and the planning team.
- Need to be intentional about implementing the final plan Many Session members had experiences with plans that had ended up on the shelf and never put to action. We must be vigilant in making sure that what the session approves as the final plan has a realistic way to be implemented as we move forward.

God brought FPC into being when faithful people of Durham and the surrounding area had a vision for a place where the gospel of Christ could be preached and taught and where God's people (inside and outside of the church) could be cared for spiritually, physically, and emotionally. We believe God is calling us to a future of faithfulness, discipleship, service, stewardship, and mission that will point us into a future in this beloved city with God's beloved people. As our parents in the faith built this church with us in mind 150 years ago, may we continue to build on

that foundation as we plan for generations ahead who will worship and serve in this place.

The FPC Confirmation Class and their mentors traveled to the Durham Friends Meeting House on Sunday,



Happenings around FPC



The FPC Worship and Arts Committee presents

Hendrika discovered iris folding about 10 years ago, when she was searching for a new Christmas card idea. The technique of iris folding was first developed to recycle envelopes with printed interior designs. Iris folding patterns are created by starting with a polygon and fitting a series of smaller polygons inside the first.

This creates a series of external triangles which are covered, sequentially, with folded strips of paper, working from the back side of the card, resulting in an inward-spiraling effect and an "iris." Adapting this technique to decorative art, Hendrika works with re-purposed frames and mats and a variety of recycled and re-purposed papers: metallic envelope liners and printed envelopes; stationery sheets; book jackets, end papers, and decorative borders; candy, chocolate, and tea bag wrappers; and gift wrap and gift bags. She loves the combination of a geometrically structured pattern and the creative challenge of coordinating paper colors and texture with a frame and mat. For this exhibit at First Presbyterian Church (on display in Watts-Hill Hall), Hendrika has created a number of new designs with liturgical and theological themes, including a Celtic Cross, an Anchor, ICTHUS, a Pearl of Great Price, a Shofar, a Pomegranate, The Holy Grail (Chalice), and a Violin.


