From the Associate Pastor . . .

God's Saving Love in Jesus Christ

The Christmas season is upon us with the renewed awareness that our God desires to save all people. This desire is personified in the figures of the Magi, the Wise Men from the East, who represent all who appear different from ourselves. The truth—that God desires the salvation of all (1 Tim. 2:4) appears so obvious to us that we forget how remarkable such news would have been in the ancient world of the Scriptures where tribalism was strong. Of course even today with such anti immigration rhetoric and the rise of white supremacist movements we often struggle to communicate this truth in its practical implications in how we live our day-to-day lives. In our divided nation, where the cancers of racism and ethnocentrism are still deeply embedded, we continue to struggle with how to translate the Gospel message of universal salvation into practical reality.

Over the years, I have witnessed our pursuit and commitment to be more welcoming and inclusive as a congregation. We have moved beyond the charge of "political correctness" to the discovery of how central our focus on diversity is to the core message of the Gospel.

It is an ongoing challenge as we look for taking even more steps to be an embodiment of our core value as an inclusive and diverse community. But most of all in this Advent/Christmas season I pray that our membership efforts will help us return time and time again to the Good News of Christmas —that God loves us all, without exception, and wishes for us to love one another with the same unconditional love that we ourselves have experienced.

It is our new life in Christ that we Presbyterians are called to celebrate, deepen, and share with the world. Let us join together, brothers and sisters, to proclaim the Gospel of God's saving love in Jesus Christ. (*Hope in the Lord Jesus, #* **235-239**)

The Session of FPC approved this **commendation** for Day School director **Katharine Smith** who is leaving her position as director of the Day School at the end of the year after 15 years of service.



Lectionary - We will not meet on this Sunday, December 23, and there is no Sunday School on December 30. We will meet again on January 6th.



FAMOUS AMOS from a Kindergartener's point of view!



Amos 5:24: "But let justice roll on like a river, righteousness like a never-failing stream!" Our lively class of Kindergarten, first and second graders are curious, knowledgeable, and full of energy and personal stories. Each Sunday is unique in this class but we always make time to sit in our

circle for a story and sit at our long banquet table for snack time. We have been studying a few of the minor prophets during the last month and today the story was about Amos.

Our story was that the shepherd, Amos noticed that there was a gracious plenty of food and wealth but that some people had more than enough while others were starving, lacked shelter and were over-taxed and Amos was persistent in attempting to deliver God's messages of justice. We were missing several friends but had a nice big group with John, Cordie, Millie, Tate, Art, Henry, Dot, Rhys, Lily, Doran, Karl, Ms. Nancy, Ms. Katharine, Ms. Kathy and myself. We shared stories and ideas that may or may not have been related to our lesson. At snack time I asked everyone to please sit on their hands. I only half expected that this would fly and was tickled that they played along with the old-school instruction. Everyone had a blank white napkin and I started the delivery rounds which are often a little crazy with requests, stories, and ideas. This time they were voluntarily quiet as I dumped a huge pile of little chocolate chip cookies on Rhys' napkin, skipped Dot, tossed down 2 for Doran, skipped Tate and John, dumped an overflowing pile at Millie's place, somebody else got one, most were skipped and Art scored an entire unopened box.

I had serious doubts that we would be able to discuss the situation and was prepared for the crumbs and complaints to fly. Instead, they were somber, quiet, and confused as every one of them continued to sit on their hands staring at their napkin. They seemed sad. Art looked away from his box.

I asked Rhys how he felt about his big pile of cookies and suggested that he had enough to save for later. He said that he didn't want them. I then checked with Millie and insisted that it was ok to have different feelings about the nice big serving. I said that it is ok to be excited about having the cookies and also feel that it might not be fair. She had a somber look on her face and said that she couldn't eat them. Everyone with a blank napkin agreed that it made them feel hungry. Finally, I put Doran on the spot. He had 2 cookies and didn't seem upset. I asked if he felt ok about his serving since 2 was a fair amount. He confidently suggested that all he needed to do was break them into smaller pieces, give everyone a piece, and then they could all eat together.

Everyone agreed that this was a great idea. We decided to redistribute the snack and everyone gobbled cookies, gulped apple juice and the happy wild rumpus was restored. Thankfully, Parker Klinck appeared right on cue to whisk them away to choir practice and off they went.

Help for those who mourn . . .

Growing thru Grief offers year-round support for those who have lost a loved one. The meetings begin with a short presentation about one aspect of grief and then we break into small groups for discussion.

We gather at 4 pm for registration, coffee, and cookies; the meeting starts at 4:30 and ends by 6.
