Dear friends,

Well, here we are. 2019. Another year behind us. Another year ahead of us. I, for one, love the start of a new year. Sometimes I love it because the old year has been particularly difficult due to griefs, losses, trials, and transitions. Other times I love it because the new year holds exceptional promise, as with a graduation, marriage, a new job, or a new challenge.



The turn of the year provides us a significant time for reflection. We are given the opportunity to look back at what has been, to reflect on what we have learned, to grieve the losses we have experienced, and to celebrate the joys we have encountered along the way. If you have not yet had the chance to sit with someone important to you — a best friend, a spouse, a parent, and/or a child, and reflect deeply and intentionally about the year past, I hope you will find the time to do that during this first month of the new year.

I also hope, perhaps as a part of this same conversation, that you will share with that person, or those people, your hopes and dreams for the coming year. Often, we hold our hopes and dreams close, too close, and fear sharing them with those we love. If you are like me, you may fear putting voice to something that makes you vulnerable, that sets you up for risk-taking or failure. But hopes and dreams voiced are hopes and dreams shared. I hope you will find time to share your dreams for 2019 with someone you love and trust – someone who will gently support you and coax you along the way.

Over the past year, I have been listening to a podcast called "The Next Right Thing." In these short (10 minutes, usually), thoughtful, and reflective podcasts, Emily P. Freeman helps us think about what is next for us and how God might be a part of moving us forward in our dreams for the future. In one podcast, she tells of how her family gathers together each year for an intentional weekend where they share their hopes and dreams for the coming year or years. They are open and vulnerable with each other, sharing bold and exciting dreams that will grow them spiritually and push them vocationally, academically, emotionally, or all of the above. I will admit that the first time I heard about this annual family event, I was envious — what a wonderful opportunity to grow together as a family and to have a group of people holding you accountable as you seek to follow your dreams! Soon, though, I set that envy aside and started thinking about how my family might be able to do something like this together — what an incredible gift!

As we enter this new year together, I invite you to find a conversation partner, or partners, who will reflect with you the year past and dream with you the year to come. If you don't have one readily available, give me a call, email, or text – I would love to have this conversation with you!

As for me, I will be honest and admit that, with my mother-in-law's move to Durham this past week, my own time for this conversation has yet to take place. But it will. I have already mentioned it to my husband and we are making plans for this conversation to occur in a quiet space where we can openly and honestly share our reflections of 2018 and our dreams of 2019.

A big part of this conversation will include these questions – Where was God in this year past? How have I grown? Where have I been challenged? What dreams to I have for a deeper, more compassionate life with Christ and my neighbor in the year to come?

I hope you will find time to ask similar questions of yourself. May God be with you in the asking, the exploring, and the growing.

From the Associate Pastor...

Dear friends,

Happy New Year! We have been awash in gifts and gifting over the past month, and at some points it can seem quite overwhelming, can't it? But two gifts in particular were noteworthy at FPC over the holidays.

First: FPC is a storage point for a new program called Welcome Home, which "gifts" people being released from prison, 700 each year in Durham, with some of the basic necessities they will need to make a fresh start. In their Welcome Home Box they will find a week's worth of food, a month's worth of toiletries, a \$25 gift card to Wal-Mart, a cell phone, and a letter from the Mayor. The Welcome Home initiative is sponsored by the Durham Local Reentry Council and other support groups who want to encourage those coming out of incarceration at a critical time in their lives. FPC supports this initiative by storing some of the gift boxes for those who will need them.

Second: Housing for New Hope called in December and asked if FPC would be "one" of three distribution points for Christmas gifts for the 226 families they have moved from homelessness to housing in 2018. Of course we said "yes," thinking we might have to store 75 gifts temporarily until families could come and pick them up. But to our wonder and amazement, three U-Haul's filled with over 600 wrapped gifts and bicycles showed up one day along with the Housing for New Hope staff to stash them in our basement. They said that their clients could come by bus and pick them up over a two day period, and that they would monitor that distribution. It was a sight to behold; jaw-dropping. But what a smooth and lovely process it was to see these families' eyes light up when they saw their particular gifts, which other churches in Durham and Housing for New Hope had provided (kudos to them).

FPC was just a bit player in both of these scenarios. But if felt lovely to be part of these large-scale efforts of generosity and care. Pastor/biblical scholar Eugene Peters says, "Our needs are a continuous invitation to live in a reality of gift-giving and gift-receiving...God gives. Life is a gift. 'God so loved the world that he *gave*'... Giving and receiving is God's creation norm." (Peterson, *Tell It Slant*, p. 184-185) Thank you for the many gifts of love which you constantly share through your involvement as the body of Christ at FPC.

Children's Sunday School (grades 3-6)

We have been trying out a new rotation model of Sunday School, which allows our $3^{\rm rd}-6^{\rm th}$ graders opportunities to experience the foundational stories of the Old Testament in many different ways through drama, art, games, LEGOS, music, cooking, gardening, etc. It has been great fun for the students and for the teaching teams! January brings a new story for us: *The Exodus*! The class meets in room 201 of the education building at 9:45. (Bring friends and join us!)

Adult "Faith & Community" -

This class began a new unit of study in December 2019, using the PCUSA resource by Chris Iosso, *Five Risks Presbyterians Must Take for Peace*. The five risks adopted by the 2016 Presbyterian General Assembly described in the book were confirmed a few months prior to the divisive 2016 US general election. For just such a time as this, these risks become even more urgent. This Sunday we welcome *Kathy Krahenbruhl* and members of the **FPC's Racial Equity Task Force** to lead us in a discussion of New Strategies for Peace. The class meets in the **apartment classroom**, upstairs in the church house at 9:45. Parents of any age are welcome.



We have finished with our visits to other faith communities, and are settling in for several weeks of conversation and study with our mentors. Over the next few months, we will be reflecting on our visits as we look at our own faith community, which worships in The Reformed Tradition, and see how it compares

to others. Confirmands and mentors are asked to be present on this Sunday, January 13, when we will prepare for the "Affirmation Service" at the 11:00 worship service, where all of our confirmands will be affirmed and gifted. Friday Bible Study


