Dear friends,

Some elders once came to Abbot Anthony, and there was with them also Abbot Joseph. Wishing to test them, Abbot Anthony brought the conversation around to the Holy Scriptures. And he began from the youngest to ask them the meaning of this or that text. Each one replied as best he could, but Abbot Anthony said to them: "You have not got it yet." After them all he asked Abbot Joseph: "What about you? What do you say the text means?" Abbot Joseph replied: "I know not!" Then Abbot Anthony said: "Truly Abbot Joseph alone has found the way, for he replies that he knows not." [1]

I once ended a sermon on a difficult text with an open question about its meaning. I had explored the text from many angles but admitted in the end that I did not know, ultimately, what God wanted to say to us through the passage. I had no definitive answers. No clear solutions. No direct advice on Christian living. I acknowledged that some texts just leave us not knowing, and implied that this was okay.

Two days later, a letter arrived in my mailbox. Two pages, typed, and single-spaced, the scholarly church member (a professor at a nearby university and a serious student of scripture) clearly explained the exact meaning of the text which I, in my youth, inexperience, (and ignorance?) had missed. He accused me of leading the congregation astray when I did not provide the clear answers and guidance found in the text. He set me straight. The answers were there. I had just missed them.

Coming out of a week like last week, I find myself wishing that I did have all the answers to the questions that continue to haunt me in situations like the Christchurch shooting of people of faith during their time of prayer. Who would do something like this? Why? How can such hatred exist in the heart of a human being? What have we done wrong as a people? How can we prevent such violence from happening again? How can we Christians live such love and bear such light that hatred is defeated, that darkness is cast out?

While I have plenty of ideas and while I won't give up spreading Christ's gospel of love, I still often find myself in that place of unknown answers. I don't know why such hatred exists in people's hearts. I don't know why people around the world chose violence to solve their problems. And please don't send me a letter of explanation. Because sometimes I think we have to be okay with not knowing. Sometimes I think we have to be okay with moving forward in the darkness because we believe in the light. . . .

Barbara Brown Taylor, in her book, *Learning to Walk in the Dark*, quotes St. Augustine of the fourth century who says, "If you have understood, then what you have understood is not God" . . . Nicholas of Cusa called this kind of unknowing "'holy ignorance,' a divine gift given to those who are willing to embrace all that they cannot and will never know about the Giver."[2]

I acknowledge in these dark days that there is a great deal I do not understand about the world, about the human heart, and about who we are to be as people who bear the light in such darkness, even as we bear our own real

pain. And ultimately there is a lot I don't understand about God. I am okay with that. Because I still believe in God, even though I can't understand God fully. "The Lord is my light and my salvation; whom shall I fear? The Lord is the stronghold of my life; of whom shall I be afraid?" (Psalm 27:1).

May God be with you, through the darkness and the mystery, and give you peace.

Long Range Planning Team Report - Building Connections

At the end of January, the Long Range Planning Team (formerly the Strategic Planning Team) met with the members of the Session and the staff for an overnight retreat to discuss priorities of the church. During this time together, we referred to our Mission Study from 2014 and our Core Values. We celebrated our strengths, acknowledged how far we had come since 2014, and acknowledged the areas of growth before us. We did some of our work in a large group and some in small groups. We discussed many important priorities, but in the end, narrowed the list down to four primary areas. Below are the four areas with some examples of the questions the Long Range Planning Team will explore as we begin to set goals and objectives that will help us move forward.

External connections – How do we build and enhance the connections we make with people outside of the church – Walk-in ministry, Day School, non-profit partners (like Urban Ministries of Durham, Habitat for Humanity, Housing for New Hope, Families Moving Forward, Step-Up Ministries, to name a few), residential and retail neighbors, visitors in worship/fellowship, inter-faith friends, support groups, choirs, NAACP, MLK Prayer Service, etc.

- · *Internal connections* How do we welcome new members, how do we care for one another, and how do we build community among our members new member classes and programs of welcome, care teams, small groups, visitation to those who can't get to worship anymore, fellowship groups, etc.
- Inter-racial connections How do we expand our welcome to all races and peoples? How do we increase our own understanding of systemic racism, white privilege, and unconscious bias? How do we build diversity in our membership and in our programming? How do we expand our relationship and build community with our sister churches, Covenant Presbyterian and Iglesia Emanuel, as well as other churches like Fisher Memorial we have had connections with in the past?
- · *Christian formation* How do we provide deep and meaningful opportunities and spaces for Christian formation and education, as well as spiritual growth and development?

These additional questions will also be explored by the Long-Range Planning Team (LRPT):

- How does our space need to be enhanced/improved/changed in order to better serve the needs named above?
- How does our staffing need to be enhanced/changed in order to better serve the needs of our ministries?



SUNDAY SCHOOL and other study opportunities

Children's Sunday School (grades 3-6)

We have been trying out a new rotation model of Sunday School, which allows our $3^{\rm rd}-6^{\rm th}$ graders opportunities to experience the foundational stories of the Old Testament in many different ways through drama, art, games, LEGOS, music, cooking, gardening, etc. It has been great fun for the students and for the teaching teams! March is upon us and so is Lent. So, beginning in March, we will begin to look at Lenten practices leading up to Easter, including making Ukranian Easter Eggs, which is an intensive (but beautiful) three-week process. The class meets in **room 201** of the education building at 9:45. (Bring friends and join us!)

Adult "Faith & Community" -

After watching the fabulous PBS documentary, *Howard Thurman: Backs Against the Wall*, we are continuing our Lenten study of Thurman's seminal work, *Jesus and the Disinherited*. Howard Thurman (1900 -1981) was an African American author, philosopher, theologian, mystic, and social justice leader, whose theology of radical nonviolence shaped, and still shapes, many civil rights leaders. On **March 24**, *Steve Rimmer* will lead a discussion of chapter 2, which begins to address what Thurman has labeled the "three hounds of hell": fear, deception, and hate. Then on **March 31** our guest presenter will be *Joe Harvard*, who will wrap up the three obstacles and focus on love. In writing his book to provide succor and strength from Jesus to those who needed it most, Thurman says, "Armed resistance is apt to be a tragic last resort in the life of the disinherited. ... Jesus chose another alternative: The kingdom of heaven is in us." (p. 15) All are welcome to join this class discussion. We meet on Sunday mornings in Watts-Hill

Hall at 9:45.

Adult Lectionary Class -

March 24: The Lord is a God of justice, so it is urgent that we repent. The Lord is a God of mercy, so our repentance will bring forgiveness. Is there a conflict between the threat and the promise? "Let the unrighteous return to the Lord, that he may have mercy on them." Join us for discussion at 9:45 in the **East Parlor**.

March 31: It is hard enough for us to forgive one another. How is it possible that God, whom we have offended much more seriously, will forgive us? That kind of extravagant forgiveness seems almost unfair.

Adult Journeys & Scratch - This weekend Journeys/Scratch will discuss the Flannery O'Connor story "Good Country People" and will discuss "Revelations" the following weekend. Both stories are available in PDF format on the internet. Many O'Connor stories have been referenced as examples of Walter Brueggemann's Prophetic Imagination. We will also take a look at some of Thurman's beautiful devotional writings. The class meets from noon - 1 p.m. in room 205 of the education building, and all are welcome.

welcome these new members following worship. Confirmands and mentors are invited to wear their "faith word t-shirts" to both the dinner meeting and for confirmation Sunday.




