**Thought #1:** Did you know that Thomas Jefferson created an alternative witness to Jesus Christ, using a sharp instrument like a penknife, to cut and paste his own version of the New Testament in order to distinguish it from "the corruption of schismatizing followers"? Jefferson, along with many of the founding fathers, were Deists, who found much of the written witness to Jesus from the four Gospel writers to be untrustworthy. So Jefferson sifted the New Testament to forge and reflect "the most sublime and benevolent code of morals which has never been offered." He created his own canon within the larger canon of Scripture that he believed to be "believable!"

**Thought #2:** Do you know how many keys are on a standard piano? Modern pianos and keyboards have 52 white keys and 36 black keys, making a total of 88 keys. Prior to the piano, the harpsichord had only 60 keys. But when composers like Haydn and Mozart appeared, the piano was expanded to today's 88 keys so they could write and play more interesting music with a wider range.

**Thought #3:** This summer, FPC will be taking a liturgical "D-tour" to explore the many texts of the Hebrew Scriptures and New Testament that have been omitted from the Revised Common Lectionary (RCL), years A, B & C, which we use regularly on a three year rotation. As those texts with which we have become so familiar only comprise about one third of the entirety of the Bible, we essentially have created our own Jefferson Bible in using only our "favorite" texts and stories; or we have only been playing 29 keys of the piano, when there are 59 more at our disposal.

Therefore...welcome to Year D, a supplement (for the brave) to years A, B & C of the RCL, which includes many of the omitted and challenging texts of the Bible. They might make us uncomfortable, and they might make us squirm, but these texts, too, are "the Word of the Lord, thanks be to God." Some of what you will notice during our brief foray for ten weeks this summer will be lessons from the apocalyptic discourse, Jesus' disputations with the religious authorities, and the passion narratives themselves. We'll begin on Pentecost Sunday, June 9, with some passages you might not immediately associate with Pentecost. The Lectionary Class will study the texts during Sunday School, and many of our summer preachers will be using them to preach. The goal of the Year D project is "to make the Word of God fully known." Let's listen together for what the Spirit might be saying to the church!

See you on Sunday, June 2, for the Ordination and Installation of our new officers, and for the recognition of our high school graduates, and on June 9, for a Pentecost

celebration and Holy Communion!


#### **Women's Spiritual Formation Class -**


