#### From the Associate Pastor:

Dear friends,

It was with great sadness that we said good-bye to sweet *Bette Conroy* this week. Bette was one of the most positive, up-beat women that I have ever met. She and her husband, Bob, were great supporters of the church. Yet when Bob died in 2009, life became more difficult for Bette. She gave up her home, moved to Croasdaile Village, and over the years suffered through several falls, as well as a gradual loss of memory. But the amazing grace was this: the more that Bette lost, physically and mentally; the more her faith increased, and the more her faith and the church meant to her. *Michael Honeycutt*, who would often give Bette and others at Croasdaile rides to church, said in an email, "*Even on her less than better' days, Bette would talk about how much FPC, the people, the ministers, and especially the music mean to her. Coming to church at FPC was a happy occasion for her. Many times on the way home, Bette would sing one of the hymns from the day's service. I feel blessed that I got to know her in this way."* 

The Apostle Paul says in 2 Corinthians 12: 9, "My grace is sufficient for you, for power is made perfect in weakness." Almost to her dying day, Bette sang her faith, using the hymns that had been so formative to her faith. Bette sang her way to heaven, surrounded by those who loved her, beckoned by those saints who preceded her. Hers was a good death, I have to say.

The reason I'm telling you this is because singing hymns is vital to our health and well-being. We sing them to praise God. We sing them to pray twice, in both word and melody. But we also sing them to fill up our inner reservoir with songs of God's love which will sustain us when times are tough. Bette was a beautiful example of the sustaining and redemptive power of an inner reserve of hymns.

This Sunday, June 30, is our summer **Myrtlefest**, a time when we pull out our oldie-goldie favorite hymns and sing them with vigor, to the accompaniment of a mandolin this year. It's something fun that we do every year. But it is more than just fun; it is good medicine! It is the best medicine there is, to fill our souls with God-songs. You might not like every hymn we sing, but there will be something there for everyone. The hymn that you dismiss might be just the one that carries your friend through "the valley of the shadow" and beyond. So come and sing for yourselves, and come and sing for the well-being of the beloved community. Accompany them with singing, all the saints on earth and in heaven. I hope to see you Sunday, if not before.






Summer Sunday School for Adults





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In the **Faith and Community Class** we are studying *Just Mercy* by Bryan Stevenson this summer. As part of this class series we are looking closely at mass incarceration, and including how it looks in Durham. *Diane Standaert* led the first two classes with a basic overview of the system and in the second week she was joined by *Muffin Hudson* who is the director of the NC Community Bail Fund and serves on the Human Relations Commission. Many of those who are in our Durham County Jail are only there because they cannot afford their bail. Wealthy people who are arrested can bond out quite easily, but when you are already living in poverty, finding the money for your freedom can be quite difficult. The result is that people are incarcerated for their poverty without yet having an opportunity to prove their innocence.

This past Sunday *Jane Williams* gave us an introduction to Bryan Stevenson, the author of *Just Mercy* and the Founder/Director of the Equal Justice Initiative. In discussion afterward we talked some about the things that FPC is doing in regard to mass incarceration issues. As a church and as individuals there are many ways we can become more involved. In regard to Money Bail Bonding, SONG (Southerners on New Ground): <a href="https://southernersonnewground.org/">http://southernersonnewground.org/</a> has had a huge effect on reducing the number of people incarcerated at the Durham County Jail just because they did not have enough money to pay their bail. \*Beth\* Brockman and \*Diane Standaert\* are both active with Southerners On New Ground (SONG), and are part of a team navigating Black Mamas against cash bail in Durham County.

The organization mentioned with Muffin Hudson is NC Community Bail Fund of Durham, and they always welcome more support: <a href="https://www.nccbailfund.org/">https://www.nccbailfund.org/</a> Poverty plays a huge role in mass incarceration, so these bail funding issues are very important.
